GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS AND RULES FOR 2022

PLEASE READ CAREFULLY

All Entries must be made in given name to receive state check.

Correct: Mary K. Smith; Incorrect: Mrs. John J. Smith

All entry blanks must contain Social Security Number.

GENERAL RULES ALL DEPARTMENTS

Entries must be received by August 29th. No late entries will be accepted.

Exhibitors enter through Gate 3.

An exhibitor shall enter in given classes only and make only one entry in a given class. Livestock class may be excepted.

A person shall not offer for exhibit any item not produced and/or prepared by themselves. Livestock must be owned by the exhibitor at least thirty days prior to the exhibition.

An exhibitor who enters 10 or more items for exhibit, they will receive a 1-day pass.

The committee, judge, or fair management reserves the right to reject any and/or all exhibits they feel are not desirable, quality exhibits, as well as items not properly entered.

Placement will be awarded on basis or quality of exhibit and the decision of the judge will be final.

All premiums will be paid by the Society. In case of inclement weather, or other uncontrollable conditions making it necessary, the Society will pay the balance of the premiums on a pro rata basis.

A premium may be awarded where there appears to merit, although there should be but one applicant and may be withheld altogether if, in the opinion of the Committee the entry offered is not deserving of any premium.

Exhibitors removing animals or exhibits prior to 6pm, Monday the 5th will forfeit their premium money.

Youth exhibits are for boys and girls up to age 20 as of January 2nd of the current year.

Youth may enter in adult classes ONLY if there are no classes in the Youth Hall

GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS AND RULES, CONTINUED

The fair association will not be responsible for loss or damage of exhibits, or injury to animal or persons.

No person shall vend any goods, wares, merchandise, provisions or refreshments, or exhibit any show or entertainment on the premises, without first obtaining license therefore from the Superintendent of Concessions.

ADULT AND YOUTH EXHIBIT HALLS

Hall entries close Monday, August 29th.

Exhibits shall be received between 3 p.m. and 10 p.m. on Thursday, September 1st.

Hall exhibits must be removed between **by 7 p.m.** on Monday the 5th. No premiums will be paid on articles not classified.

Grange exhibit spaces available measure 8 ft. x 3 ft. x 4 ft. high.

New classes may be listed and judged, provided there are three or more entries, and at the discretion of the fair officials.

Jams, Jellies and relishes process in open kettle or hot water bath, Pressure for fruits, tomatoes, vegetables, and meats. **All jars to be in pints except jams, jellies and relishes which should be in standard jars. Rings shall be removed for judging.**

All food entries shall be bagged in clear baggies, except for cakes which shall be wrapped in clear plastic on plates.

LIVESTOCK

Livestock classes close Monday, August 29th.

Pure Bred Beef judged on Sunday. Youth Baby Beef, class 27, to be shown on Sunday.

Registration numbers of all purebred stock must be listed on entry blank, or certificate shown to Stock Superintendent.

No animals may leave rounds until after 5 p.m. on the day they are judged.

Poultry and rabbits will be judged Saturday. They must be in pens between 3 p.m. and 8 p.m. Friday and can be removed at 6 p.m. on Monday September 5th.

Animals and exhibitors that display disorderly conduct will be disqualified at the discretion of the superintendent.

2022 MAFA State Photography Competition

The Massachusetts Agricultural Fair Association (MAFA) is hosting a statewide photography contest this year. The first-place winner from each member Fair will be judged at the Annual MAFA convention this November. The winning photos will be featured in one or more MAFA and MDAR publications. The winning photographers will receive special recognition and passes to many Massachusetts Fairs.

What does my member Fair need to do to take part in this contest?

- Each member Fair must publish the information and rules about this competition in their premium book.
- Each member Fair must submit one first place **non-professional** photo in adult and/or youth categories that meets the regulations for this contest by November 1st.
- Each Fair may either select their winner(s) from existing classes in their photography department or the Fair can create a new class specific to this contest.

Contest Rules & Regulations

- The photo must be exhibited in a MAFA member's 2022 Fair by a non-professional adult and/or junior exhibitor.
- The subject of the photo must be agricultural in nature and/or depicting the agricultural aspects of a Massachusetts Fair.
- The photo must be exhibited and judged to be the best overall photo that meets the subject criteria for this contest at the originating member Fair.
- Though photos may be exhibited at the Fair in a certain size, frame, etc., only an 8x10 un-matted and unframed photo will be judged at the convention. Therefore, winning photographers may need to resize and/or de-frame & de-matte the original exhibited piece before it is submitted to MAFA.
- The winning photograph will reproduce with the best quality if it is taken with a minimum of 300pdi, but this is not a requirement for submission.
- MAFA and MDAR have the right to use the winning photograph in publications promoting agriculture in the state of Massachusetts.

Entries made in show ring will not be honored by Secretary. They will not receive

All dairy animals must be registered in exhibitor's name.

Registration papers must be checked by superintendent for animal ownership, date
of ownership, breeder and breeding.

No adults allowed in show ring or assisting on Youth Day.

DRESS CODE: Exhibitors must wear either slacks, skirts, or dresses in white or
khaki. No shorts or bathing attire will be allowed. A solid durable shoe must be
always worn. No sandals, clogs, sneakers or bare feet will be allowed.

Exhibitors will be barred from show ring for non-compliance to dress code.

Appropriate clothing must be worn for type as well as showmanship classes.

CLASS 2 - Sheep

Rules and Regulations - Please bring your book

NOTE: Sheep will be shown on Sunday. Department will be open to receive animals at 8:00 a.m.

1. Entries must be made on printed forms which will be provided by the fair management. In making entries the exhibitor must specify owner's name and address; class number for each class to be entered and flock and sheep association ear tag number.

2. Certificate of registry on all animals must be furnished to the fair management or superintendent on demand.

3. Age of animal will be figured as of September 1.

4. The breeds listed will share in the premiums listed. Cheviot, Corriedale, Dorset, Hampshire, Shropshire, Southdown, and Suffolk. Natural Color and Tunis will be allowed if 3 or more breeders make regular entries and sheep are present on show day.

5. Rams must be Purebred. Exhibitors may only show one yearling ram per breed.

6. Show Condition: all sheep must be properly fitted and blocked, or they may be disqualified by the fair management.

7. Each exhibitor is limited to the showing of not more than two breeds.

8. An exhibitor may enter and show as many animals as he wishes in single classes, limited to two premium awards in each class.

9. Animals shown in group classes must have shown in single classes.

10. In group classes exhibitors are limited to one entry.

11. Exhibitors will be responsible for their own feed and bedding.

12. The decision of the judges shall be final.

13. Entries close August 29th.

14. All sheep must be unloaded and penned before showing.

15. Sheep must be penned by 10 a.m. Sunday, September 4th

16. Judging will start at 10:30a.m,

17. Order of judging will be as the classes are listed in premium book.

18. Sheep will be discharged at 5 p.m.

Ewe and Ram Lambs are divided into Junior & Senior Divisions, age breaking dates are as follows: Jan.1 - Corriedales, Dorsets, Hampshires, Suffolks, any other breed; Feb. 1 - Southdowns; Feb. 15 - Shropshires; March 1 - Cheviots.

Sr. Lambs teeth - mouth can be broken but yearlings not in full use - rams & ewes.

ADGA Sanctioned Combined Doe Show

Rules and Regulations

This show is sanctioned by the American Dairy Goat Association and their rules govern. The show is sanctioned for Alpine, LaMancha, Nigerian Dwarf, Nubian, Oberhasli, Saanen, Toggenburg and Recorded Grade. This show is not separate sanctioned for Juniors and Seniors are separately sanctioned. All entries must be postmarked by August 29, 2022. Advance entry fee is \$5.00 per animal. **Late entry fee after August 29th is \$8.00 per animal. Make checks payable to Melissa Ferguson. Day of show entries or substitutions must be at the Secretary's table by 9:00.** The base date for computing age of an animal is September 5, 2022. The original registration certificate is required for each animal over 6 months of age or older and must be shown to the Show Secretary before the show. Duplicate applications stamped by ADGA will be accepted for animals under 6 months of age. Animals may be shown with a signed transfer on the certificate. No copies, telegrams or phone calls will be accepted in lieu of the above requirements. All animals must be accompanied by a valid health certificate signed by an accredited veterinarian certifying that the animals are clinically free of infectious or contagious disease and exposure from such diseases. These certificates must be available upon request to fair inspectors. Health Certificates must be dated January 1, 2022 or later. These documents will be accepted for the entire fair season in Massachusetts. All animals must be free of sore mouth and scrapie exposure.

Judging begins promptly at 10:00. Animals must be in place by 9:00. Classes close once judging begins. No preshow milk out. Please wear white or khaki show wear. ADGA Grand Champions or Best of Breed winners must stay to compete for Best of Show or forfeit its leg.

Judge's decision will be final, and premiums will be awarded accordingly. The Show Committee reserves the right to interpret and amend the show rules. The Union Agricultural Society of Blandford cannot be held responsible for loss, damage or accident to any

person, animal, or property at the fairgrounds. All animals entered at the owner's risk. Animals must be on the grounds from 9:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. or end of show. For show entry form contact Show Secretary Janet Ferguson.

Rules Governing Poultry Shows

Department will be open to accept animals from 3 p. m. to 8 p. m. Friday night

1. The show management shall provide an area outside exhibition area for the inspection of birds by the poultry inspectors, and any birds not accepted will not be allowed into the exhibition area.

2. Any bird that shows any clinical symptoms of disease must be returned to the owner's premises as soon as possible, and the premises placed under quarantine until examination by a poultry inspector and found to be in satisfactory health.

3. Any bird showing clinical symptoms of disease during the time of the show shall immediately be removed by the inspector or the superintendent of the show and placed in an area outside the exhibition hall.

4. All poultry shown at poultry shows and fairs must be blood tested and have a pullorum-typhoid passed or clean classification. All poultry must be examined by poultry division inspectors or Department of Agriculture veterinarians for clinical symptoms of disease. Capons are exempt.

5. All entries must be the bona-fide property of the exhibitor or entries made by a hatchery from flocks controlled by them. Any individual loaning fowls shall be equally responsible with the party or parties showing them.

6. An exhibitor shall not enter fowl which have been exposed during the past thirty (30) days to any contagious or infectious disease, nor exhibit fowl that have been exposed or affected at the time of the show.

7. If any bird in an exhibitor's flock shows any clinical symptoms of a contagious or infectious disease, this shall eliminate the whole flock from the show.

8. Show coops and cups shall be of such material that they can be kept sanitary.

9. All fowl exhibited shall be inspected daily by a person who is qualified to ascertain their physical condition.

10. A judge shall not be required to handle any fowl exhibited which shows any evidence of having any contagious or infectious poultry disease.

It shall be the duty of a licensed A.P.A. judge or any other judge to recommend to the show management the correction of any unsanitary or unhealthy condition existing in the show room which may affect the health of fowls exhibited.

All entries must be in the hands of the Secretary not later than August 29th.

All entries must be in pens Friday 8 p.m.

In any case where there is only one entry, prize money will be awarded accordingly to quality of bird. No exhibitor shall be allowed to show more than five varieties of fowl.

No exhibitor shall have more than 2 entries under one number.

RULES GOVERNING DRAWING CONTESTS

2022

For Horses, Oxen and Ponies

All draft animals: horses, oxen and ponies must be weighed on the scales, located in the Shepard Scale House.

Horse pulling, ox pulling and pony pulling contests will be governed by the rules of the Division of Fairs.

COMMONWEALTH OF MASSACHUSETTS DEPARTMENT OF FOOD & AGRICULTURE RULES AND REGULATIONS Rule 36A

Any individual, firm or corporation found guilty of administering drugs which may affect the conduct, actions, endurance, strength, speed or performance of any animal competing in any pulling competition within the Commonwealth of Massachusetts, shall be barred from any pulling competition for the next calendar year. Second offenders shall be punished by forfeiture of prize monies and the individual, firm or corporation shall be barred for life in any pulling competition held in the Commonwealth of Massachusetts.

ANIMAL HEALTH REGULATIONS

COMMONWEALTH OF MASSACHUSETTS DEPARTMENT OF AGRICULTURAL RESOURCES/FAIRS

In addition to complying with all laws and regulations governing animal health issues (M.G.L. C. 129 §§14D, 14E, 44 and 330 CMR 4.03, 4.07, 16.03), all fairs must adopt and enforce the following rules for governance of the fair:

2022 Fair – Animal Health Rules

NO animal will be admitted to the fairgrounds unless it meets the requirements below. NO animal is to be unloaded or enter a barn or tie-out stall until the animal and its paperwork have been inspected and approved for entry.

A. General Rules for All Animals

1. All animals must be in proper physical condition, be properly identified and free of visual evidence of infectious, contagious or parasitic disease at time of arrival. Specific diseases and conditions which will disqualify an animal for entry are identified for each species in the following sections of the rules. **Animals of any species with open or draining wounds will not be approved for entry.**
2. Evidence of infectious, contagious or parasitic disease or failure to produce the necessary documents for **health certification, vaccination or testing will result in the animal's rejection for entry. THE INSPECTOR'S DECISION IS FINAL.**
3. Any surgical procedure or injection of any foreign substance or drug or the external application of any substance (irritant, counterirritant, or similar substance) which could affect the animal's performance or alter its natural contour, conformation or appearance, except external applications of substances to the hoofs or horns of animals which affect appearance only, and except for surgical procedures performed by a duly licensed veterinarian for the sole purpose of protecting the health of the animal, is **prohibited.**
4. All livestock must have proper ID, official metal ear tag, tattoo, scrapie tag for goats and sheep, registration or microchip. For animals identified by microchip, readers must be available to the Inspectors.
5. **Health Certificates - All animals, entering a Massachusetts fairground from out of state must be accompanied by a valid health certificate signed by an accredited veterinarian certifying that the animals are clinically free of infectious or contagious disease and exposure from such disease. Documents of health certification must be written on relevant state or federal health forms only. In-state animals may be accompanied by a certificate of examination on a veterinarian's letterhead stationery which clearly identifies the contact information for the veterinarian signing the certification. All animals on the certificate must be individually identified. Certificates written on plain paper are not acceptable. All Health Certificates must be dated January 1, 2021 or later. These documents will be accepted for the entire fair season in Massachusetts. These certificates must be available upon request to fair inspectors.**

6. ADDITIONAL REQUIREMENTS FOR EACH SPECIES ARE LISTED BELOW.

B. Cattle

1. **TB and Brucellosis testing is not required for animals from TB-Accredited and Brucellosis-Free States** and in-state animals. Current brucellosis and TB status in the exhibitor's state can be obtained from the state veterinarian's office in each state. If the exhibitor's state is not TB-Accredited or Brucellosis-Free, then the exhibitor must call the Massachusetts Division of Animal Health for entry requirements (617-626-1795). All animals must be free of visual evidence of the following diseases and conditions: foot rot, mange, pinkeye, ringworm, warts, cowpox and open or draining wounds.
2. While not required, it is strongly recommended that all cattle be currently vaccinated for rabies.

C. Poultry

- CI. No poultry will be admitted to a fairground until it has been individually inspected.
- CII. All poultry must be free of visual evidence of the following diseases: infectious bronchitis, coryza, pullorum-typhoid, fowl-pox, external parasites and laryngotracheitis.
- CIII. Each bird must be accompanied by written proof (ID card or test report) that the breeding flock was blood-tested negative for pullorum-typhoid within one year prior to entry date.
- CIV. Birds from quarantined states will not be permitted entry.
- CV. All birds over 16 weeks of age as of January 1, 2022 shall be individually leg banded with a state leg band. This includes out of state exhibitors.
- CVI. No bird vaccinated for laryngotracheitis within thirty days of the fair will be admitted.

D. Goats

1. **TB and Brucellosis testing is not required for animals from TB-Accredited and Brucellosis-Free States** and in-state animals.
2. All goats and kids presented, regardless of age, must be individually listed and identified on the health certificate. All goats must be free of visual evidence of the following diseases and conditions: foot rot, mange, pinkeye, ringworm, warts, pox and open or draining wounds. All goats must also be free of sore mouth and scrapie exposure.
3. Based on the Federal Scrapie Eradication Program (FSEP), goats and sheep of any age or sex brought to show or exhibition from either out of state or within state must possess a USDA approved individual identification tag, tattoo, or electronic implant consistent with the requirements of the FSEP and the Massachusetts Emergency Order 1-AHO-06. Information on approved tags, tattoos, and electronic implants is available from the USDA-APHIS office in Sutton, MA at 508-363-2290.

E. Camelids (Llamas, Alpacas, etc.)

1. **TB and Brucellosis testing is not required for animals from TB-Accredited and Brucellosis-Free States** and in-state animals. Current brucellosis and TB status in the exhibitor's state can be obtained from the state veterinarian's office in each state. If the exhibitor's state is not TB-Accredited or Brucellosis-Free, then the exhibitor must call the Massachusetts Division of Animal Health for entry requirements (617-626-1795).
2. All Camelids originating from outside the Commonwealth are required to be tested for Blue Tongue. Exception: Animals from a USDA declared "Low Incident State" are exempt. Note: New England and New York are low incident states.
3. All animals must be free of visual evidence of the following diseases and conditions: foot rot, mange, pinkeye, ringworm, warts, pox and open or draining wounds.

F. Swine

1. All swine must be identified by an official ear tag or registration.
2. Swine must be free of visual evidence of the following diseases and conditions: erysipelas, atrophic rhinitis, mange and open or draining wounds.
3. No person shall import into Massachusetts from outside the state any swine which have been

pseudorabies vaccinated. M.G.L. c. 129 §14E.

- 4. No person shall import into Massachusetts swine from Stage I or Stage II Pseudorabies States.
- 5. All swine shall originate from qualified pseudorabies-free herds or monitored herds in qualified pseudorabies free States only. The pseudorabies status of the exhibitor’s state can be obtained from the state veterinarian’s office in each state.

G. Sheep

- 1. No sheep will be allowed entry from flocks in which Scrapie has been diagnosed or in which animals are under surveillance for Scrapie during the previous eighteen months. Based on the Federal Scrapie Eradication Program (FSEP) and the Massachusetts Emergency Order 1-AHO-06, sheep of any age or sex brought to show or exhibition from either out of state or within the state must possess a USDA approved individual identification tag, tattoo, or electronic implant consistent with requirements of the FSEP. Information on approved tags, tattoos, and electronic implants is available from the USDA APHIS office in Sutton, MA at 508-363-2290.
- 2. No sheep will be permitted entry from flocks in which Soremouth has existed or in which Soremouth Vaccine has been administered in the previous sixty (60) days.
- 3. Sheep must be free from visual evidence of foot rot, sore mouth, pink eye, ringworm, and open and draining wounds.
- 4. While not required, it is strongly recommended that sheep be currently vaccinated against rabies.

H. Equine

- 1. All equines entering a Massachusetts fairground must have a valid health certificate.
- 2. All equines must be free of visual evidence of the following diseases and conditions: mange, ringworm, sores, strangles, and open or draining wounds.
- 3. All equines originating from within and outside of the Commonwealth must have a negative US-DA-approved EIA test (i.e., Coggins test or ELISA test) dated within twelve months of entry.
- 4. While not required, it is strongly recommended that all equines be vaccinated for rabies, tetanus and EEE and WNV within one year of the fair.

I. Rabbits

- 1. Rabbits must be free of visual evidence of the following diseases: snuffles, wet tail, skin, and ear infections.

J. Dogs and Cats

- 1. All dogs and cats must be free of visual evidence of the following diseases: kennel cough, distemper, hepatitis, parvo, ringworm and mange.
- 2. **All Massachusetts dogs and cats and those originating from out of this State must have a valid and current vaccination certificate for rabies.**

All petting zoos are required to have a USDA Exhibitor’s License and valid health certificates.

Pumpkin Bundt Cake

Ingredients

2 ¼ cups Sugar	2 tsp baking soda
1 cup Vegetable oil	2 ½ tsp pumpkin pie spice
3 large Eggs	½ tsp salt
3 cups all-purpose Flour	1 Can (15 ounces) pure pumpkin puree

Cream Cheese Frosting

Ingredients

4-ounce cheese, softened	1/2 tsp pure vanilla extract
1 Tbsp unsalted butter, softened	1-2 Tbsp milk
1 ½ cup confectioners' sugar, sifted	¼ tsp pumpkin pie spice (optional)

Directions

Preheat the oven to 350°F. Spray a 10-inch bundt pan with nonstick cooking spray. In the bowl of a stand mixer fitted with the paddle attachment, or in a large bowl with an electric mixer, combine sugar and oil until thoroughly blended. Add eggs, one at a time, beating well after each addition. In a medium bowl, sift together flour, baking soda, pumpkin pie spice and salt. Add flour mixture to egg mixture alternately with pumpkin, beating well after each addition. Transfer batter to prepared bundt pan. Bake in a preheated oven for 60-65 minutes or until a toothpick inserted near the center comes out clean. Cool 10 minutes before inverting onto a wire rack. Remove the pan and cool completely before preparing the cream cheese frosting.

Cream Cheese Frosting

For the cream cheese frosting: In the bowl of a stand mixer fitted with the paddle attachment, or in a medium bowl with an electric mixer, combine cream cheese and butter; mix until well-combined and fluffy – about 2 minutes. Gradually add in confectioners' sugar. Once the confectioners' sugar is completely incorporated, mix on medium speed for 2 minutes.

Mix in vanilla and milk. If the frosting appears to be too thick, slowly add in a little more milk until you reach the desired consistency. If desired, add pumpkin pie spice and mix until well-combined. Spoon over cooled cake.

The show is open to any youth 9 through 20 years of age as of January 1, who meets entrance requirements.

All animals must be owned by the exhibitor prior to July 20, 2022 for sheep and April 1, 2022 for cattle.

All purebred animals must be registered in the names of the exhibitors.

SHEEP: All animals must be purebred and registration papers to be checked upon request only of the supervisor; ear tags and tattoos must be on animals.

Department will be open to accept animals at 8:00 a.m.
Sheep must be on the grounds at 10:00 a.m. Saturday. Releases will be issued at 5:00 p.m. Saturday.

Animal entries are limited to 2 in single class, 1 per group class.
First and second prizes will not be paid if there are less than three animals in a class unless the judges deem the animals worthy of such prizes.

Ages of animals will be figured from July 1, 2020.

Calf, 4 months to 1 year
Yearling, 1 year to 2 years
Two years and older

Any animals under 4 months of age cannot be shown or used in group classes.

Entries close August 29th at 5:00 p.m.:

Animals in this show not eligible to be entered in classes 2 or 3.

No animals shall be blanketed during the hours of the Fair, 8:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m.

Any class may be split at the decision of the judges.

Registration papers must be checked by superintendent, for age of animal, ownership, date of ownership, breeder, and breeding.

DRESS CODE: Exhibitors must wear either slacks, skirts, or dresses in white or khaki. No shorts or bathing attire will be allowed. A solid durable shoe must be always worn. No sandals, clogs, sneakers or bare feet will be allowed. Exhibitors will be barred from show ring for non-compliance to dress code. Appropriate clothing must be worn for type as well as showmanship classes.

Each animal must have a sign or card over its stall showing name, breed, date of birth, name of sire and dam and name of exhibitor.

Animals and exhibitors that display disorderly conduct will be disqualified at the discretion of the superintendent.

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PREMIUM LIST

2 cups all-purpose flour

1 tsp. baking soda

1 tsp. baking powder

¼ tsp salt

¾ cup (11/2 sticks), Butter, Softened

1 ½ cup granulated sugar

3 eggs, lightly beaten

1 tsp. vanilla extract

½ cup buttermilk

1 ½ Cups mashed ripe bananas

Chocolate Frosting

1/2 cup (1 stick) butter
1/3 cup cocoa

1/3 Cup evaporated milk or half-and-half
4 Cups sifted confectioners' sugar
1 tsp vanilla extract

Directions

1. To make the cake, heat the oven to 350 degrees F. Grease and flour two 9-inch round cake pans. Combine the flour, baking soda, baking powder, and salt in a medium bowl, and stir with a fork to combine well.
2. In a large bowl, combine the butter and sugar, and beat well, about 2 mins. Add the eggs, one by one, and the vanilla. Beat well for 2 to 3 mins more, scraping down the bowl occasionally, until you have a smooth batter.
3. Using a large spoon or spatula, stir in half the flour just until it disappears into the batter. Stir in the buttermilk, and then the remaining flour, the same way. Quickly and gently fold in the mashed bananas, and then divide the batter between the 2 cake pans.
4. Bake at 350 degrees F for 25 to 30 mins, until the cakes are golden brown, spring back when touched lightly in the center, and begin to pull away from the sides of the pans.
5. Cool for 10 mins. In the pans on wire racks or folded kitchen towels. Then turn out onto wire racks or plates to cool completely, top side up.
6. To make the frosting, in a medium saucepan, combine the butter, cocoa, and evaporated milk. Place over medium heat and bring to a gentle boil. Cook, stirring often, for about 5 mins, until cocoa dissolves into a dark shiny essence. Remove from the heat and stir in the confectioners' sugar vanilla. Beat with mixer at low speed until you have a smooth, thick frosting.
7. To complete the cake, place one layer, topside down, on a cake plate, and spread about 1 cup of frosting evenly over the top. Cover with the second layer, placed top side up. Spread the frosting over the sides and then the top of the cake

FIRST - Study the rules as given in the premium list.

SECOND - Follow the premium list *exactly*.

THIRD - Make out entry blanks before coming to the Fair.

FOURTH - Select specimens by process of elimination; for example: If you are to exhibit beets, *pull a lot of them*. Spread out on the lawn. Select several of the best, put to one side and *wash*. From this lot, select five that are the most uniform in size and shape. *Do not pick the largest or the smallest*, but the kind you would select to eat. *Cut tops off to one half inch. Do not cut tap root.*

SOME OF THE THINGS THE JUDGES LOOK FOR

Vegetables

1. Exact number of specimens as called for in the premium list.
 2. Uniformity - each specimen like every other in size, shape and color.
 3. Quality - not too large, not too small, fine texture, etc.
 4. Freedom from blemishes - no cuts, bruises, insect injury or disease.
 5. Cleanliness - product washed or wiped as one would prepare for market.
- Canned Goods (to be processed- open kettle or hot water baths for fruits and tomatoes, pressure for vegetables and meats.)

1. Products should be of the best quality, uniform in size, and of good color.
2. The liquid should be clear, free from sediment and proper amount in jar.
3. The container should be uniform, clean, properly sealed and labeled.

Jelly

1. Clear of good color and consistency.
2. The containers should be uniform, clean and labeled.

Jam

1. Good color and consistency and properly sealed.
2. The containers should be uniform, clean and labeled.

Baked Goods

1. Properly wrapped, accompanied by recipe. If a package mix is used or a modification, so indicate.
2. Attractive, good color, texture and flavor.

Clothing and Home Furnishings

1. Condition of article, suitability, construction and workmanship, design, color, originality and ease of care.
